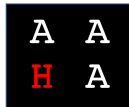

TOPIC: *DEFINING HATE CRIME; THE SILENT EPIDEMIC - MEDIA'S ROLE*

PROGRAM SYNOPSIS:

The rise in hate crimes across the US has created fear, isolation, and mistrust. Victims often report feeling re-victimized by the very institutions charged with protecting them. The Asian community has been especially impacted, raising the questions of why this is happening and what role our institutions may be unwittingly playing. This program will start with a clear definition of hate crime, followed by a look at the influence media



and law enforcement can have on addressing it. Our speakers will discuss these topics through a solutions-centric lens and respond to audience questions at the conclusion.

TOPIC: REPORTING HATE CRIMES IN TARGETED COMMUNITIES, THE CRITICAL ROLE OF EDUCATION

PROGRAM SYNOPSIS:

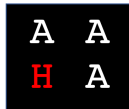
Hate Crimes and incidents have increased dramatically, while reporting these crimes often falls far short of the actual numbers. Immigrant communities often face language barriers and fear of retaliation that keeps them from reporting. When they do report, secondary victimization sometimes occurs because people processing their report have racial biases, don't have enough training or may just be insensitive to the victim's experience. Creating a supportive interface with law enforcement interaction is critical to facilitating accurate and open reporting if hate crimes are to be effectively addressed. The education system likewise offers key opportunities for interrupting the cycle of hate that can lead to hate crimes, by creating an atmosphere of respect and inclusion from the earliest age possible.

Far more than just the immediate harm, rising hate crimes and hate incidents throughout California and across the United States have deep implications for our democracy. These heinous acts ripple across entire communities, threatening ethnic groups, and attacking the elderly and vulnerable, causing a loss of confidence in who we are as a nation and what it is we truly stand for. To protect against continued erosion of our country's foundation, we must act decisively to identify solutions and vigorously implement them. Law enforcement must be part of any effective solution, and this requires properly educating and training every officer at every level. Fair, unbiased, and accurate reporting on hate crimes and hate incidents is likewise an essential facet to any solution.

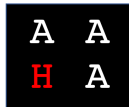
TOPIC: HISTORICAL PERSPECTIVES ON HATE CRIMES AND IMPACT TO OUR ECONOMY

PROGRAM SYNOPSIS:

LA County's Commission on Human Relations recently issued its annual report documenting a 23% jump in County hate crimes from the previous year. While the official report noted that Asian hate crimes once again recorded the largest percentage increase, local news coverage only gave a glancing reference, without the dramatic percentage increase to the Asian community. Hate crimes affect all of us, some more than others. One major implication of all hate crime growth is on the state's economic vitality, as fear of being victimized can affect businesses by making them targets or by keeping customers away out of fear of being attacked. Act Against Hate Alliance goes beyond the talk to identify solutions, and to do so is bringing together stakeholders from every sector with a solutions-specific focus. This program will consider the economic impact of hate crimes and address their similarity to terrorism and will also explore a more historical view of hate crimes and their targeted communities, from the 1980s to present day.

ACT Against Hate Alliance Rings in 2023 with an Education Focus for Hate Crime Solutions

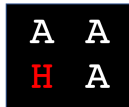
Seeds of hate can take hold early; an astute education program can help eradicate them

Act Against Hate Alliance (AAHA) was founded in 2022 to focus on finding and implementing solutions against hate crimes. With collaboration from government leaders, community members, experts, law enforcement, educators, policymakers, and thought leaders, AAHA progress is already notable with an honest dialogue commenced identifying root causes of hate crimes and the practices resulting in revictimization of hate crime victims. One fundamental key to the AAHA solutions focus is programming for education institutions at all levels, from pre-school to university, programming that provides students with a nurturing platform for discussion, open expression, and a consistent, clear foundation that makes inclusion and diversity not something they do, but who they are. But just as important is getting students at different levels involved in minimizing hate crimes and hate incidents as part of their civic engagement while attending school.

Launching 2023 with education leading the AAHA agenda, the first Media program on Wednesday, January 18, will set the stage by bringing together trailblazers in several facets of education. We welcome Senator Josh Newman, who is introducing a State Resolution to declare January 28th the "Stand Against Hate Action Day", the leader of a top national K-12 school executive recruiting and school training firm, a Trustee on a county board of education, a law enforcement leader whose California community took action against hate crime, and a high school and college student who are spearheading action in their schools to empower students to recognize and speak out against hate in all forms.

TOPIC: LAW ENFORCEMENT ROUNDTABLE: ACTION AND PROACTION CRITICAL KEYS TO PREVENTING AND STOPPING HATE CRIMES

PROGRAM SYNOPSIS:

ACT Against Hate Alliance was established to focus on identifying and implementing solutions against hate crimes. With the continued rise of hate crime throughout California, the timing could not be more critical. This process requires a clear understanding of what hate crime is, a candid, open discussion of causes of hate crimes, collaboration of all stakeholders and commitment of resources to find solutions and restore confidence. The role of law enforcement is a crucial one and can include involvement of all agencies at multiple levels. Law enforcement also needs to strengthen relations and build trust with communities so that those served feel encouraged to reach out, and validated and respected when they do so. The ACT Against Hate February 8 Round Table bringing law enforcement leaders together in a candid discussion about how their organizations are responding to hate crimes and changes they want to see in the future for substantive, permanent progress to be made.

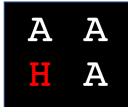
